





Teaching and Learning

Welcome back, we hope that everyone enjoyed a relaxing Spring Bank break.

We are starting to work with the Primary Schools who will be welcoming your children in September. We have already had some visits and individual schools should be contacting you about what other transitional arrangements they are offering such as stay and play, stay for lunch, open evenings. The receiving schools will also be provided with a copy of your child's leavers report and their final assessment data. All these documents will, of course, be shared with you towards the end of next term. We will also have some special celebrations planned for children in school as some of them prepare to move on to the next part of their educational journey. We have two picnics planned for both Tuesday 18th and Thursday 20th July. We are also hosting a Graduation event on Friday 21st July from 3.30 to 4.30. We will be sending out invitations with more details nearer the time but please save the date.

For those children who are leaving us, please see the link below about what we feel are important in terms of 'school readiness'. This is formed on a whole child approach and covers predominantly the personal, social and emotional skills that will support children as they move to a new setting. Some children suffer from increased anxiety when there is lots of talk about transitions, it may be worth considering how soon you start to talk to your child about moving school.

What is the curriculum?

The curriculum is everything we want the children to experience and learn whilst they are in nursery. Learning includes new words, new skills and new knowledge. Experiences include trips out of nursery, times when we invite people in, like the balance bikes or the Life Caravan. We also have special extra experiences in School such as the caterpillars this half term and our regular themed weeks.

Children learn a great deal of our curriculum through play and activities of their own choosing. They also learn through our careful selection of 'books and rhymes of the week' that we highlight on our short-term weekly planning.

How do young children learn? How do we teach young children?

We have lots of evidence about how young children learn. Here are some of the key points:

- Language: chatting, playing and reading with children every day helps them learn lots
 of new words. Language is the foundation of children's thinking. Children who are
 good communicators at five are most likely to be successful learners throughout their
 time in school.
- Relationships: it is very important for children to feel safe and secure. That's why
 every child has a key person within the staff team. Children become more
 independent when they have strong and loving relationships to fall back on. They also
 become better at developing emotional resilience when they find something hard, or
 get upset, angry or frustrated.
- Independent play: children need uninterrupted time to choose their own play and make friends. Adults will often get involved, in a sensitive way, to help the children to learn whilst they are playing. Adults will think about the important knowledge children need and how they can learn this whilst they are playing.
- Adult-guided play: children also need times when adults plan and guide their play. A play activity might be guided so it has a clear focus on learning to count, for example.
- Direct teaching: sometimes adults work directly with children to teach them new things. This could include learning to use scissors, or ride a bike, or writing some of the letters of their name.

How can parents support children's learning?

Our partnership with parents is an integral part of our ethos. You know so much about your child and your ongoing support and encouragement will make a big difference to their learning. We regularly share photographs, videos and ideas for home learning via EYLog and our parental handouts of our enrichment groups. "We are explorers" week commencing 19th June

We will be looking at a range of different experiences such as the caterpillars that will be temporarily residing in each classroom whilst we watch them change. Perhaps you'd like to dress your child in the traditional outfits of a particular country. We will have two themed lunches that week – menu to follow. Children do not separate their experiences into play and learning since they

learn as they play and can have fun while they learn; there are therefore many contexts for children's learning. Recognising that different contexts encourage different types of play and exploration is a key factor in providing suitable experiences to support both children's transient and long-term interests. When children show such long-term interests' colleagues can build on the opportunities offered by inspiring children's investigations, providing further ideas or resources and recognising that children need time to explore at their own speed.
