In Maths we will be:

- Exploring repeating patterns using claps, taps and simple action sequences.
- Subitising small groups of stars (1–4) during our Twinkle Twinkle star drop activity.
- Recognising small quantities (1-3) in quick reveal games such as Cars in the Tunnel.
- Using finger patterns to show numbers without counting.
- Sorting classroom objects by colour, size, type or texture, and returning them to the correct areas.
- Taking turns in simple comparison games, such as rolling cars down a ramp to see which travels the furthest.

In Phonics we will be:

- Developing our visual memory, remembering where objects and picture pairs are hidden in simple games.
- Listening carefully to sound-talk, identifying instruments by their initial sounds with Rosy Robot.
- Matching sounds to visual cues using Len's
 Footsteps characters such as the mouse, fairy, lion
 and giant.
- Taking turns with instrument games, copying sound patterns and responding to what we hear.

Learning opportunities:

This week in our enhanced and continuous provision, the children will have opportunities to:

- Explore mark making with black sand, coloured paper and black playdough.
- Enjoy space-themed small world play linked to our stories.
- Investigate light and dark using dark dens and torches.
- Count and sort objects such as stars by colour, size and texture.
- Work together on large construction, including building a rocket.
- Create large-scale artwork with black paper and white paint rollers.
- Use Busy Things on the interactive whiteboard, taking turns and solving simple problems.

Help at Home:

Why not try exploring light and dark at home this week? You could:

- Go on a little torch hunt around a dark room shine the light on objects and see what you can find.
- Look out of the window at night-time together and talk about what you can see (stars, moon, streetlights, shadows).
- Make your own dark den using blankets and cushions, then explore it with a torch.
- Read a story in a cosy dark space using a nightlight or torch.

These simple activities help children understand nighttime, shadows, and how light changes what we can see, all part of our learning this week.
